Report on "Feedback from the professionals and employers regarding the dental curriculum at DAPMRVDC"

Interns and dental professionals with three to thirty years of experience provided qualitative input on the dentistry curriculum. A total of 26 feedbacks were obtained.

Employers expressed satisfaction with the former students. They claimed that our former students have greater self-assurance and communication abilities.

After a thorough analysis of the qualitative input, the following major themes were identified:

1. What is your opinion on the current dental curriculum and its impact on the employability?

Theme 1: Curriculum is adequate

Agreater percentage of the professionals thought the program prepared students for practice and was sufficient. They did not recommend alterations to the curriculum.

Theme 2: Curriculum is inadequate and needs restructuring

Only a smaller percentage of professionals felt that the current curriculum does not adequately prepare students for the demands of the workforce. They pointed up six particular areas that needed work:

- 1. It is important to improve soft skills like communication and interpersonal relationships.
- 2. Teach students how to handle life-threatening and emergency situations.
- 3. There is a need to improve practice management and practice-focused training.
- 4. Research has to be improved.
- 5. Strengthening the clinical exposure is necessary.
- 6. Financial management training is desperately needed.
- 2. Suggestions to enhance the quality of curriculum implemented at DAPM R V D C The following suggestions were received to enhance the quality of curriculum at DAPMRVDC.

These included inputs on strengthening the student teaching and assessment modalities, additional training programs and improving the infrastructure:

2.1. Student teaching and assessment modalities

- Enhancing patient interaction skills by implementing a comprehensive care system to encourage students to view patients holistically.
- Facilitate a quicker transition from classroom learning to hands-on experience, allowing students to apply theoretical concepts in a real clinical environment.
- Foster an environment where students can learn from each other's experiences

- Implement strict student learning assessment, by including of OSCE (Objectively Structured Clinical Examination) and other higher-level assessment methods.
- Integration of case-based problem-solving exercises, as this will increase the student's ability to critically analyze the case, strengthen the student's diagnostic skills as we expose them to variety of clinical cases.
- Regularly review and update the curriculum to eliminate outdated or obsolete procedures
- Provide opportunities for students to experience and learn from private practice settings

2.2. Additional training:

- Conduct faculty development training programs on effective curriculum implementation strategies.
- Introduce a short course for students on comprehensive patient management during their internship
- Develop a training program focused on handling medical emergencies to better prepare students for real-world situations
- Stimulate interest in research among dental students by showcasing its relevance to clinical practice and advancements in dentistry.
- Incorporate training sessions on research methodologies and encourage student involvement in research projects


2.3 Improving Infrastructure:

- Strengthen clinical exposure by increasing the patients inflow into the institution.
- Invest in simulator-based training tools and ensure the availability of improved materials and equipment
- Introduce specialized clinics such as implant clinics, geriatrics clinics, comprehensive dental clinics, and VIP clinics to provide diverse clinical experiences
- Regularly update the curriculum to include advances in dentistry beyond the basic requirements.

The feedback obtained from various stakeholders was put forward in a meeting called by the Head of the Institution having Feedback committee head as moderator with heads/representatives from the departments, UG Committee, PG Committee, Health Professional Education Unit, Career guidance cell. Phase 1:








Y – axis: Grades from 1 to 4, 1 being unsatisfactory to 4 being excellent.




Y – axis: Grades from 1 to 4, 1 being unsatisfactory to 4 being excellent.




Y - axis: Grades from 1 to 4, 1 being unsatisfactory to 4 being excellent.






